## Welcome to Oamaru & Waitaki District

Government- The NZ elections are every three years and are based on the MMP (mixed member proportional representation) system.

Waitaki- The population of the Waitaki District is approximately 23000 with 14000 people residing in the town of Oamaru. Diversity is increasing with 50+ different ethnicities.

Waitaki District Council- The Waitaki District is governed by the Waitaki District Council. The council comprises of the Mayor and 10 Councillors. Elections are held every three years. The Oamaru offices are on Lower Thames Street and there is also a service centre in Palmerston. You can go in, phone or use the website. www.waitaki. govt.nz

If you own a home or property, you will have to pay rates to the Waitaki District Council and the Otago Regional Council. Water charges are included in the general rates. Councils manage libraries, swimming pools, parks, roads, dogs, noise control, building consents, art galleries, playgrounds and much more.

Rubbish- The Waitaki District
Council doesn't provide a kerbside
rubbish or recycling collection
service. Kerbside rubbish and
recycling collection is instead
provided by private contractors
Awamoa Bins, Waste Management
and Wasteco.

In Oamaru, recycling can be dropped off to the Resource Recovery Park on Chelmer Street for a small cost. Most garden waste and all general waste must be taken to the Refuse Transfer Station out the northern end of Oamaru. There are also recycling depots in Hampden, Kurow, Otematata, Omarama and Palmerston (Waihemo Wastebusters).

Recycling bins are provided in Papakaio, Enfield and Herbert.

Libraries- Are a place where you can borrow books, use wifi, learn computer skills, attend childrens' activities, community talks, book chat groups etc. They also stock copies of most of the main NZ newspapers. Go and visit the friendly teams in Oamaru, Palmerston, Kurow, Otematata and Omarama

Budget Advice- Provides a free confidential non-judgemental, one to one financial management service and advocacy. Situated in Community House at 100 Thames Street. Ph 434 6196

Inland Revenue(IRD) - Usually visit the Oamaru Work & Income office on the third Thursday of every month. Phone 0800775247 for an appointment.

NZ Laws- Children cannot be left at home unsupervised unless they are 14 years of age.

- -A babysitter must be 14 and capable of caring for others.
- -All children up to the age of seven must be in a car seat appropriate to their age and size
- -Children must attend school from age 6-16.
- -You must be 16 to get a learner driving license and to have a sexual relationship.
- -You must be 18 to vote, to purchase alcohol and to get married.
